

Concurrent Enrollment in a Nutshell!



What is Concurrent Enrollment?

Concurrent Enrollment is college-level coursework given to motivated high school students with a desire to get an early start on their career path. With successful completion of each course, students will receive **both high school AND college credit.**

Where are Concurrent Enrollment classes offered?

Conveniently, many Concurrent Enrollment classes are offered here at Herriman High School:

You should only register for CE classes that align with your Plan for Career and College Readiness (PCCR). General Education courses are appropriate for all qualified students.

Do I qualify for Concurrent Enrollment?

To be a perfect candidate for Concurrent Enrollment you should:

- Be in 11th or 12th grade (10th grade by appeal)
- Have a GPA of 3.0
- Maintain upper-level academic standing – have a goal to achieve A's and B's
- Have and keep good attendance

How much will Concurrent Enrollment classes cost?

Admission is through SLCC with a one-time application fee of \$40.00 and tuition for each CE class is \$5.00 per credit hour. For example, a 4 credit hour class would cost \$20.00.

What is the difference between Concurrent Enrollment (CE) and Advance Placement (AP) classes?

Concurrent Enrollment

- High school and college credit are given simultaneously for a passed course and a permanent college transcript is created.
- CE classes are typically 1 semester.
- Tuition is required.
- Pre-requisites/scores may apply

Advanced Placement

- Credits are given in high school for a passed course, and college credits are earned by submitting passing scores from the AP exam to the college of your choice.
- AP classes are year- long.
- AP exam fee required.
- Teacher recommendation required, and pre-requisites may apply.

Both CE and AP are rigorous college courses. These classes are designed to prepare you for higher learning. Careful planning and consideration should be used when deciding which type of course to take. Your high school counselor is a great resource to steer you in the right direction!
